

What will you have in your hand Today?

So the Lord said to him: "WHAT IS IN YOUR HAND?" Exodus 4:2

Moses didn't have much - a handful of sheep on a blistered mountain. He also had 80 years of memories some sad and regretful. He had some clothes, a family, a wise father-in-law and a tent in the desert. That's about it.

OH YES HE HAD A STAFF!

He probably found a broken branch from a sturdy tree maybe 6 or 7 feet long and straight. He seasoned and smoothed it to become his walking cane; plus it was useful in herding the sheep and warding off predators, but quite ordinary!!! Just a rod.
